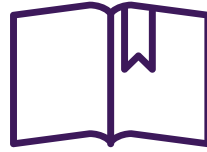

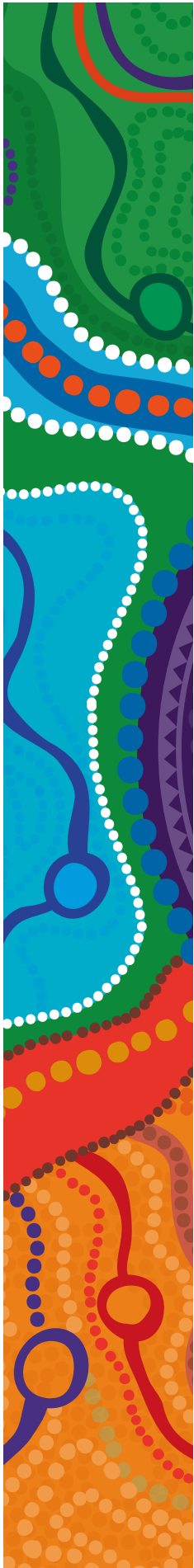

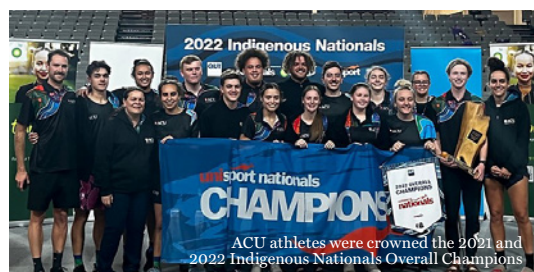

ACCESS AND DISABILITY SERVICE

Students with a temporary or ongoing mental health/medical condition or disability, as well as those who are neurodivergent or have significant carer responsibilities, are supported by access and disability advisors who will work with them to develop a plan to help manage their studies.



ACU ALLY NETWORK

The ACU Ally Network is a visible network of staff who support our pastoral commitment to providing a safe, inclusive and respectful university environment for people who identify as being lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender diverse, intersex, queer and asexual (LGBTIQ+).

Timetables, units and course maps

What will my timetable look like? How many units will I study? What are classes like at uni? Studying an undergraduate degree – eg a bachelor’s degree – is very different to studying at high school. You won’t be in class from 9am – 3pm five days a week, and the structure of courses and classes is also different.

Here is a quick rundown of a few key topics to help you understand what’s involved when you study at university.

TIMETABLES

Timetables depend on the course you choose and if you decide to study full-time, part-time or in an accelerated mode. As a full-time student, you may be able to squeeze all your subjects into three days a week – but you also need to set aside time to read, research, review and complete assignments and exams.

Full-time uni schedules are typically designed so you have the flexibility to work part-time – so you can earn money, volunteer or pursue other passions while you study.

CLASSES

Classes are in different formats and may be held face-to-face, online or through a mix of the two. You’ll usually have lectures (typically a large group of students with an academic presenting), tutorials (smaller group discussions with an academic) and workshops/practicums/placements (interactive experiences where you refine your skills). Practicums/placements often occur in real-world settings – for example a business student may complete an internship at a company, a nursing student a placement at a hospital, and an education student a placement at a school.

UNITS AND ASSESSMENT

Units are the subjects within your course. Each unit has a specified number of credit points that count towards your degree. Degrees will have core units that you must complete as part of the course, and some will have electives which are units you can select that are not a mandatory inclusion.

Each unit will also have its own assignments and exams, and each of these assessments will have a different percentage weighting towards your final result. For example, in one unit you may have a written assignment worth 40% of your final result, a multiple-choice exam worth 20% of your final result, and a group presentation worth 40% of your final result.

Assessments will vary for each unit you are studying and can include things like written reports, written essays, group presentations, individual oral presentations, in-class practical examinations/demonstrations, multiple-choice exams, quizzes, etc.

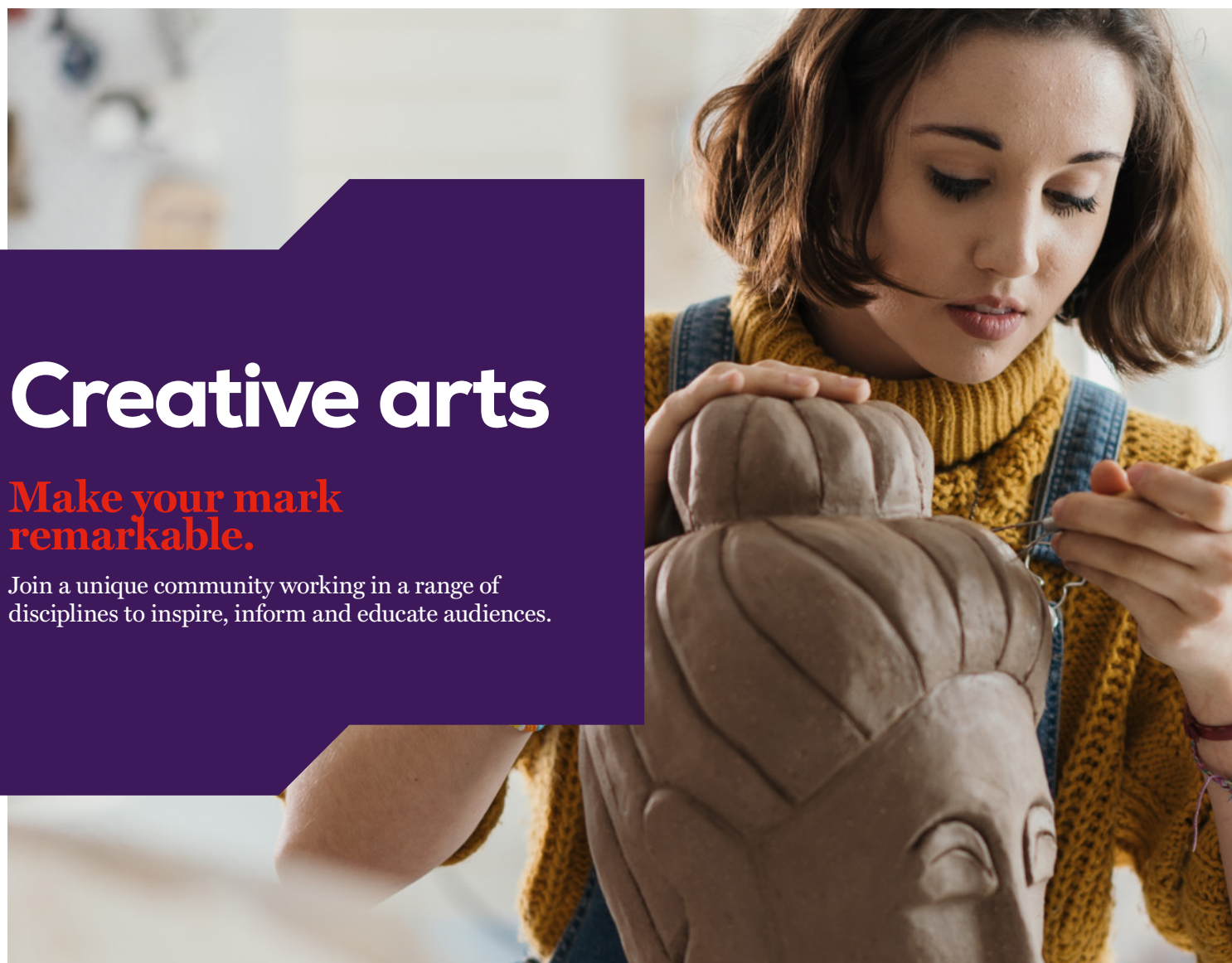

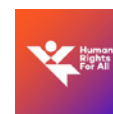

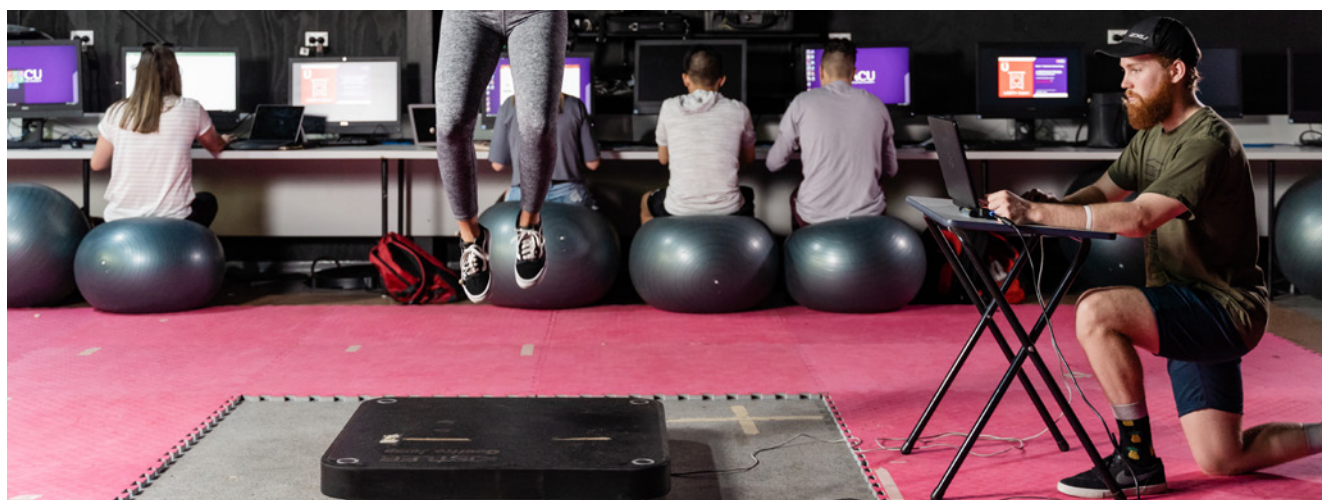

Note:

For successful completion of all Initial Teacher Education courses, students are required to demonstrate they have met mandatory approved benchmarks in both literacy and numeracy, evidenced through LANTITE (Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education).

To apply for all Initial Teacher Education courses, you will need to complete a Suitability for Teaching Assessment as part of your application for admission into a teaching course. 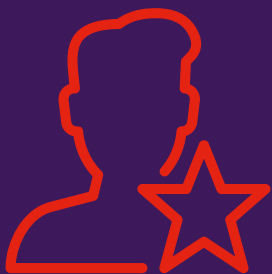

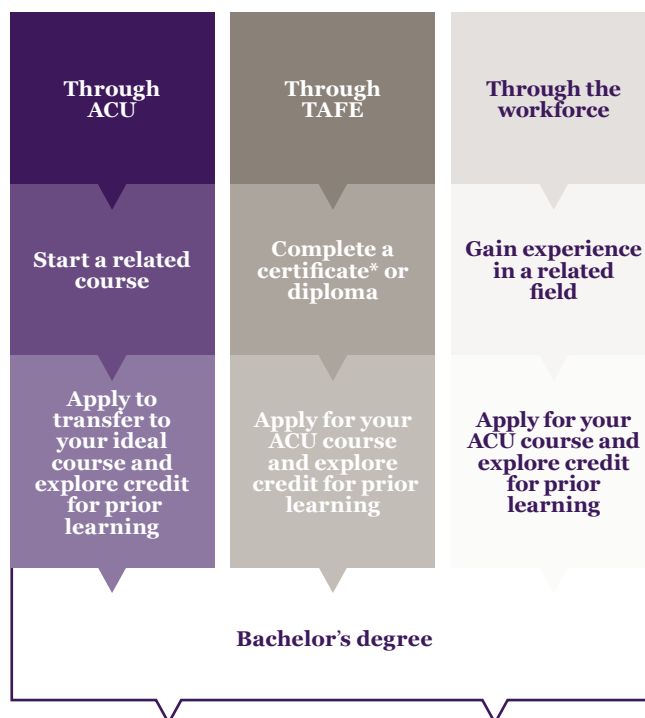

SPECIAL TERTIARY ADMISSIONS TEST

If you don't have a selection rank, or a recent academic history, you can still get into university. The Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) is a two-hour, multiple-choice aptitude test that allows applicants who are 21 years or older to demonstrate their potential for tertiary study.

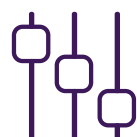


ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER ADMISSION PROCESS

As an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander, you may be eligible to apply for entry to ACU through our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander admission process. This process considers factors other than your ATAR. Through the process you will meet with a member of the Indigenous Higher Education Unit and a faculty representative. Your potential to undertake study will be based

upon your previous studies, life experiences and achievements. Applications for most courses are made directly through the relevant state Tertiary Admissions Centre (UAC, QTAC or VTAC). For more information you can contact the Indigenous Higher Education Units.

Educational access schemes

If you have been unable to reach your full potential or had restricted access to the courses of your choice due to life experiences, such as financial

hardship, personal illness, home environment and responsibilities, education disruption, and English language difficulties, you may be eligible for an educational access scheme. Applications for the Educational Access Scheme (Qld, NSW and ACT) and Special Entry Access Scheme (Vic) must be made directly to your Tertiary Admissions Centre. You can receive up to six points for the Educational Access Scheme. You can receive up to seven points for the Special Entry Access Scheme.



Scholarships

TYPES OF SCHOLARSHIPS

Our scholarships range in value from \$1,000 to \$160,000, and are available to eligible students studying in every discipline across all of our campuses.

Our scholarships fall into two categories:

- Merit scholarships – awarded to students who have excelled in some area.
- Equity scholarships – provide support to students who are facing financial hardship or other disadvantages.

We also offer scholarships which can help with costs associated with student accommodation.

CREATING OPPORTUNITY FUND (COF) SCHOLARSHIPS

To create even more opportunities for our students, we’ve developed our COF scholarships. These scholarships aim to break down barriers to higher education by helping students experiencing financial hardship or other disadvantages reach their potential. Valued at \$4,000 each, they are designed to support you to achieve your goals, no matter what circumstances you may be facing.

It always pays to apply. You never know when you may be successful and scholarships can be a huge help. You’re welcome to apply for as many scholarships as you’re eligible for. Fees

Most Australian students will be studying in a Commonwealth supported place (CSP), where the Australian Government makes a contribution to the cost of your study, and you pay the ‘student contribution’. Depending on the course, a CSP undergraduate student at ACU in 2023 pays between \$4,120 and \$15,136 per year of study. These fees may change for 2024.

Most Australian students pay their student contribution through the HECS-HELP scheme. This means the government lends you the money, and you start repaying the loan once your income gets above a certain amount. Alternatively, you can pay your student contribution upfront by the due date.

There are also a range of other loan schemes and government financial assistance available. For more information, visit studyassist.gov.au

OTHER COSTS

As a student, you will also need to consider a range of expenses such as the student services and amenities fees, living costs, textbooks, computer equipment and uniforms (if applicable to your course).
